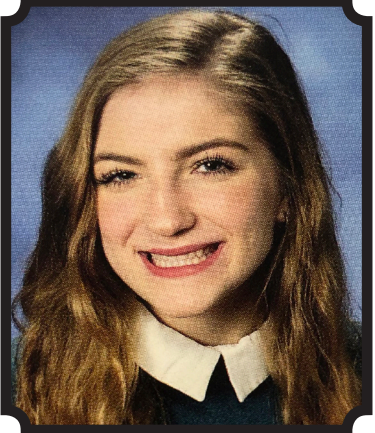


Valedictorian Natalie Terry-Martin
